Community Perception

- Seven out of eleven focus group respondents would be more motivated to shop at the local farmers' markets if they knew which vendors accepted EBT and had more information on the Double Up Food Bucks program.
- Nine out of eleven focus group respondents said they would rather buy fresh produce at Walmart, Aldi, and Dillions than at a Farmers Market due to convenience and better deals.
- All focus group respondents agreed that people without cars have been impacted the most from limited or lack of access to healthy foods due to various reasons.

want to use sidewalks for physical activity and transportation.


Commercial Tobacco Control

Initiative Wide: In general, my community has sufficient options for healthy eating.



Key findings:

About half of survey respondents across the 24 *Pathways* grantee counties said that their community has sufficient options for healthy eating.

Results are based on data from an initiative-wide survey of Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Kansas members for whom e-mail addresses were available in each of the 26 counties in which BCBSKS has funded coalitions as part of the *Pathways to a Healthy Kansas* Initiative. N=2,857. The survey response rate was 3.4 percent.
